What a difference a week can make. New data released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Friday shows an 18% jump in people testing positive for influenza last week. Now, according to the CDC, 21 states and New York City are experiencing "very high" levels of sickness.

# Hospice care advocate aims to increase awareness, reduce stigma surrounding industry

"I think we all know that the population over age 65 in the United States is growing at a rapid pace," [Ruth] Thomson, DO and chief medical officer of Four Seasons, a nonprofit hospice and palliative care provider serving 13 western North Carolina counties, told *McKnight's Home Care Daily Pulse*. ...
